

Vice President Equity and Welfare - Role Description

Officer Role:	VP Equity and Welfare

Role overview:

This role exists to represent and support the student body on issues relating to welfare, including mental health, wellbeing and safety, and to represent and support students from marginalised groups, such as Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic students, students of faith, LGBTQ+ students, women students, trans students, non-binary students, students from disadvantaged socio-economic backgrounds and students with disabilities.

- To represent and seek the views of students at London Met in relation to welfare, equality and inclusion, leading on the student support, health and wellbeing and equity and inclusion agenda within the University
- Represent and engage with students of all types of study, across campuses
- To achieve your priority goals in line with your manifesto and chosen projects
- Be the key day-to-day contact for the University relating to equity and welfare issues

The VP Equity and Welfare Officer will ensure that each and every student has adequate support for issues that they might encounter as a student at London Met and ensure that London Met is a welcome, open, inclusive and accessible environment for all students to study. They will represent and support student welfare both on and off campus, working to support student initiatives linked to these issues. They will seek to understand the nuances and experiences of every marginalised group, especially those they don't belong to, and work towards removing barriers to participation and success for students from these groups and backgrounds, and promote a more diverse and inclusive experience while at university.

Working with the other Full-time and Part-time Liberation officers, they will ensure that all students have a dignified, supportive and inclusive university experience irrespective of their background or identity.

You don't apply for this job, it's down to an election process. The full time officer role lasts for one year, starting from around the last week in June to the start of July. If you're really into it, you can run for election a second time. But that's it, it's the law!

Location:	London Metropolitan University: Holloway Campus, Aldgate Campus and remote working. In this role you will also visit other Universities, or attend conferences around the UK representing London Met Students.
Time commitment:	This is a full time (35 hours a week), paid job. Usually working hours are between 9:00 and 17:00 but often as an officer you will attend events in the evening or weekends. These hours can be claimed back as 'Time off in lieu". You wouldn't be able to undertake full time studies whilst doing this role so you'd either need to postpone your next year of study if elected as an officer or if you're a final year student, then you would start this role before you graduate.

Supported by:	Elected officers of the Students' Union receive support from the Students' Union staff team including the CEO, Deputy CEO/Director of Membership and a wider staff team.
Training and support offered:	 Dedicated summer training programme along with your other full time officers Access to national training delivered by the National Union of Students or other bodies An officer development budget
Useful abilities and previous experience:	No previous training or experience is required, but an interest in representation and the Students' Union will set you up well for the role. You will need to be reliable and organised, as well as a good communicator and listener.
Role requirements:	 General requirements for the role of VP Equity and Welfare as well as those listed in the role overview: To be a member of relevant committees at the University as required To be a member of the Students' Union Executive Team To work closely with Student Services, the Centre for Equity and Inclusion, Estates and other relevant services and departments to remove barriers to student success, ensure that all students at London Met have access to adequate welfare provision and support and improve the accessibility of the University campus To proactively champion student rights and safety, both on and off campus To promote a more diverse and inclusive Students' Union and University experience for all students, working with Part-time Liberation Officers to identify and remove barriers to participation and success for students from marginalised groups and improve the accessibility of SU activities and functions To work closely with the Advice Service to ensure relevant and effective advice is available to students and work with students to support initiatives which support student wellbeing To campaign on issues relating to welfare, especially those from marginalised groups To be a trustee of the Students' Union strategy and the development of the Union To work with the Full-time and Part-time Liberation Officers, creating a positive team culture ensuring that the work of the Union is cohesive and joined-up Promote and defend the rights of the members Promote and defend the rights of the members Promote and defend the rights of the members To lead on developing relevant policy and positions within the Union and University Work in accordance with, and in furtherance of, the Policy of the Union To maintain your Students' Union email account, replying to emails and queries as and when they come in
